ere's a cookbook that doesn't shy away from the gooey details.

Radio personality Lisa G.
best known for her spots on Howard Stern's (below) "Howard 100 News" on Sirius XM — dishes the details on her tumultuous relationships, wild lifestyle and love affair with baking in the fittingly titled "Sex, Lies & Cookies."

"I was hanging from chandeliers, having sex and making cookies," says the radio star.

The memoir traces Lisa G.'s life through cookie recipes — from "Lisa Goes Nuts Brownies" and "How to Get a Man Chocolate Chip Cheesecake Squares" to "Linzer Broken-Heart" and "Chocolate Therapy Chunk" — telling the story of a driven woman who didn't have time for a good man. Somehow, though, she could always find time for a jerk.

"I would date a nice guy, and I didn't know what to do with him. Then I would break up and find someone who was unavailable."

Lisa G., a Woodmere,
L.I., native, got her start
on Chicago rock radio
back when an intrepid reporter would get
scoops by checking
the leftovers on a
room service tray to
see what a touring
Mick Jagger had for
breakfast.

That's when she formed her bad habit of rejecting available

men, passing on the really nice TV sports reporter Rick for the married record promoter Bryan.

"I had a really hard time faking interest in a boyfriend's ups and downs at the office while I was hanging out with rock stars," she writes.

And which rock stars where those? "Well, Styx was really big, at least back then,"

she laughs.

But it wasn't until she returned to New York that her troubles, and baking, began in earnest. Her partying got bigger in the Big Apple, and she quickly discovered her "Lisa Goes Nuts Brownies" were a perfect cure for the morning after. "I was a piece of work," says Lisa G. of her cocainefueled '80s nights. "The people I work with now don't believe the stories, but they are all true.'

She wound up losing her gig anchoring ABC's nationally syndicated Rock Radio Network after making up sports scores when she went on

the air without a script.

Her love life was equally halfbaked: Lisa G. would try to make moves on the not-so-bright and not-so-nice David, who cruised other women while they were on dates. Once she showed up at his Lamie Foxx door nude under a fur coat, bearing a plate of "How-to-Get-a-Man Chocolate Chip Cheesecake Squares."

But her career began heating up with a big break on Ed Lover and Dr. Dre's hit hip-hop show on Hot 97. They called her L'il Snowflake, because she was so white, and dropped the name Lisa Glasberg in favor of the radio name Lisa G.

"We were over the top and genuine and had so much fun. People were ringing the private doorbell nonstop just to hang out with us. Jamie Foxx would take the red-eye in just to hang. Will Smith would hang all morning long. Jay-Z would stop by all the time."

At some point back then, Lisa G. went into therapy and realized baking cookies to make loser guys love her was a waste of flour - but baking for friends was a pleasure and a party

She started throwing cookie parties that grew and grew. So many friends and strangers were attracted to her baked goods that guests would spill out of her upper East Side apartment into the hallway. By the time she moved to WOR, they were massive events, with one evening featuring desserts from chefs Alfred Stephens of Mesa Grill, Erik Blauberg of the 21 Club, Anthony Bourdain and Jacques Torres.

She still runs into people who she assumes are strangers, but who tell her they already met over a plate of cookies.

Now she happily works red-carpet events among other duties for the Stern show, shouting questions to the likes of Sarah Jessica Parker, Steve Carell and Zach Galifianakis. Glasberg brings her baked bounty to work, and even

though her boss isn't a cookie man, Stern did take the cover photo and his wife, Beth Ostrosky Stern, suggested she tuck a heart-shaped cookie into her bosom for the shot. As for dating, Lisa G. - who won't give her age but insists she is "not past my expiration date" is still learning the recipe. 'The men I meet are either going through a divorce or have been through a divorce, and that is not a happy place for me." There's always the

How-to-Get-a-Man Chocolate Chip Cheesecake Squares

- 1-2 rolls of store-bought chocolate-chip cookie dough
- 2 8-ounce packages of cream cheese, at room temperature
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 8-10 ounces candy toppings (M&M's, toffee bits, chocolate chips, etc.)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a 9-by-13-inch pan with parchment paper so that it overhangs on the short ends of the pan - this way the bars will easily lift out after baking.

Take slices of cookie dough (or crumble dough with hands) and press together on the bottom of the pan to make one smooth layer.

Mix cream cheese and sugar. Add eggs, then vanilla. Pour mixture over the cookie crust and smooth with a spatula.

Top with any candy you like. Alternatively, you can use a second roll of cookie dough and place slices on top of the cream cheese mixture to form another cookie laver. Don't worry about neatness, the rounds will bake together.

Bake for 30 to 35 minutes. Let cool. Place in freezer until frozen, then remove from pan and slice into 16 bars or 32 bite-sized squares.

LISA G. SAYS: 'You can dump everything into a bowl at the same time if necessary [especially if you're headed out for a booty call - no judgments here], and





Fruity Pebbles Cookies

½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, at room temperature

1/2 cup packed light brown sugar

¼ cup sugar ¾ teaspoon vanilla extract 1 egg

1 cup all-purpose flour ½ teaspoon baking soda **2 cups Fruity Pebbles** cereal, divided

2 large parchment-lined cookie sheets

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Cream butter and sugars. Add vanilla. Add egg and blend well

In a small bowl, stir together flour and baking soda, then mix into the wet ingredients. Now add one cup of the cereal and mix lightly, just until distributed.

Using a small ice cream scoop, scoop out dough onto prepared cookie sheets,

about 2 inches apart. Now take your remaining cup of cereal, and place a small pinch of it on the top of each cookie, lightly pressing down until just slightly flattened.

Bake 10 to 12 minutes, until just slightly golden at the edges.

Let cookies cool on rack.

Makes 30 small cookies.

Lisa G. says: "If you feel like you're going bananas because your guy won't commit, by all means add Banana Nut Crunch. If your boyfriend is a real jackass, then Apple Jacks would be perfect, and maybe you should eat them yourself he doesn't deserve cookies. If you want to drop a big hint and tell your guy that you're ready to go all the way, mix in some Lucky Charms. You get the drift."

Sugar Cookies

1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, at room temperature

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 3 cups all-purpose flour 1 egg (for egg wash)
- 21/2-inch round cookie
- cutter **Sprinkles or other toppings** (optional)
- **Parchment-lined baking** sheets

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Cream butter and sugar



until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla, and mix until incorporated. Now slowly add flour until it forms a dough.

Turn out dough on floured surface and divide into two portions. Cover both in plastic wrap, and chill about 20 to 30 minutes, until firm.

Roll out to 1/4-inch thickness on floured surface. Using 21/2-inch round cookie cutter, cut out cookies and place on parchment-lined cookie sheet with a metal cookie spatula, spacing cookies an inch apart.

Beat remaining egg, in a small dish. Brush beaten egg wash on cookies, adding sprinkles (or whatever toppings you like).

Gather up scraps of cookies and roll out again. If cookie dough gets too soft, rechill.

Bake 12-15 minutes. Do not overcook. They're done when they puff and look set. Cool cookies on rack.

If you want to ice the cookies, skip the egg wash and ice cookies when completely cooled.

Makes about 47 cookies.

Lisa G. savs: "This is a very easy cookie recipe to make and remember. I call it the 1, 2, 3 recipe: 1 cup sugar, 1 cup butter, 1 egg, 2 teaspoons vanilla, 3 cups flour. After all I went through to feel good about myself, I wanted something very easy and delicious to be the last cookie in the book."
